INFORMATION AT HAND: VIEWING CONTENT ON YOUR HANDHELD



Last issue we discussed capturing multiple Web pages to your handheld. In this article we'll examine how to capture other types of content to your PDA, especially that with a mix of text and graphics.

Having pre-formatted content for the PDA is great when it is available. The ability to capture content from Web pages with pro-

grams such as iSilo is another helpful option for viewing content. But are there options for other content such as Word documents, PowerPoint files, graphics, and other electronic documents you want to view?

One tool that is very helpful for capturing and viewing content on the PDA is a software package called RepliGo. RepliGo 2.0, found at <http://www.cerience.com>, is available for both Palm and Pocket PC.

The program works like many PDA viewing software packages – it consists of a

conversion component for the computer (\$ 29.95) and a RepliGo viewer component for the PDA (free). The steps to capture and con-

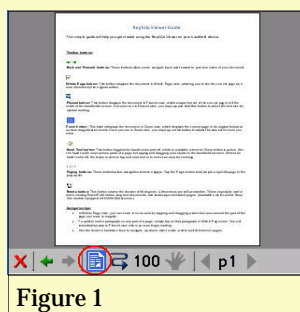

vert content using RepliGo are very easy. Let's say you have a PowerPoint file you would like to view on your PDA. You first open the file in PowerPoint on your computer where you've installed RepliGo. Then you click on

File, then Print. You'll see a new choice listed among your printers – that for RepliGo. Selecting this will initiate the process of converting the file for viewing on the handheld. Once conversion is complete, you sync your device and tap on the RepliGo icon to launch the program and view your file.

RepliGo content is reminiscent of a screen capture – it does a wonderful job of capturing both text and graphics from the original document. Unlike a screen capture, however, RepliGo offers different ways to view your document. You can

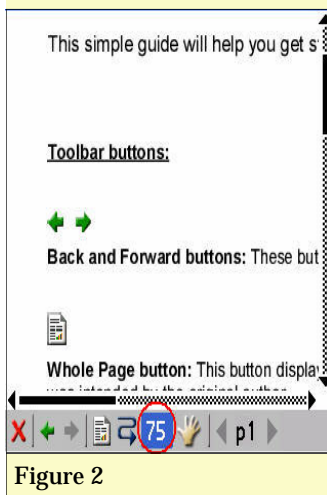

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view an entire document in a thumbnail view (Figure 1), or zoom in to better see graphics (Figure 2). Or, you can change to a flowing view which automatically takes the text from the document and reformats it so it fits in the screen



width of the PDA. This works well for Microsoft Word and other text documents (Figure 3).

To make things even more streamlined, RepliGo integrates itself into your Mi-



crosoft products' toolbars. So, while in PowerPoint or Internet Explorer, for example, you can click the RepliGo icon in the toolbar to convert a document with a single click.

Like many products, RepliGo offers a 14 day free trial, so give it a try and see what RepliGo can do for you!

OPEN ACCESS: PIE IN THE SKY?

PANEL DISCUSSION AT MAC 2004 IN RALEIGH

Journal publications are the engines that drive science ever since 1665, when the *Philosophical Transactions of the Royal Society* was first published in London, England. Recently however, the traditional conventions of journal publishing have been changing with the movement toward open access. The open access movement, as MLA defines it, is putting peer-reviewed scientific and scholarly literature on the Internet and making it available free of charge and free of most copyright and licensing restrictions.

Please join us at the MAC meeting in Raleigh on 14 October 2004, at 4 p.m., for an enlightening panel discussion about the move toward open access in publishing. The panel members will be:

Linda Watson, moderator and panelist. Linda has been actively engaged in scholarly communications issues over the past several years, including the subject of Open Access. She is presently Chair of the Scholarly Communications Committee of the Association of Academic Health Sciences Libraries,

a member of the MLA Task Force on Scholarly Publishing, and a member of the Open Access Working Group.

Wallace McLendon, panelist. Over the past several years Wallace has spoken on technology planning at the state, regional and national level. He is now immersed in research and teaching about the management of emerging technologies in libraries. He has made presentations on the present state and future of scholarly communication.

Brigid Hogan, Ph.D., panelist. Chair of the Department of Cell Biology at Duke University Medical Center. Dr. Hogan is considered a world leader in developmental biology and stem cell research. She was an early convert to the open-access movement, and is currently on the editorial board of, and is a contributor to, *PLoS Biology*.

The Claude Moore Health Sciences Library (CMHSL) has begun a project with the Jefferson Area Board for Aging (JABA) to help underserved, rural and low-income seniors use computers to access online health information. The project is funded by the National Network of Libraries of Medicine, and includes a partnership with SeniorNavigator.com.

This project will affect four of JABA's eleven centers in central Virginia: Scottsville Senior

Center; Nelson County Senior Center; Fluvanna Senior Center; and Mary Williams Senior Center. Library staff, including Outreach Librarian **Kelly Near** and Collection Services Acquisitions Assistant, **Tim Breeden**, will educate JABA staff and
